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report of the executive committee

Founded in 1971 by environmental activists from France, Sweden, the UK and the US, Friends of the Earth International (FoEI) was created to tackle environmental problems at every level, from the community to the international. Today, the federation boasts 75 member groups, 5,000 local activist groups and more than two million individual members and supporters around the world.

FoEl's members are united in demanding environmental justice and peoples' rights. For FoEl environmental justice is intrinsically linked to social justice, human dignity, respect for human rights and the self-determination of peoples. In 2015, our demands for a fundamental transition towards a world based on economic and environmental justice and people's rights began to bear fruit in political arenas, as well as on the ground.

transforming political agendas

For example, the idea of corporations being held legally responsible for their crimes, no matter where they occur, is finally becoming a reality, with negotiations beginning in June. Together with allies we have been campaigning for a treaty to hold transnational corporations to account for many years, and the proposed treaty now has the support of more than 800 organisations, the United Nations Human Rights Council, the Vatican, and diverse governments.

Our advocacy and mobilisation around food sovereignty and agroecology, together with strategic allies such as La Via Campesina, is also having an impact at the political level, as well as on the ground. By the beginning of 2015 it was obvious that agroecology was moving up the political agenda of the Food and Agriculture Organization rapidly. As a result agribusiness interests moved onto the offensive, aiming to weaken the agroecological

approach by seemingly accepting it and absorbing it into the 'business-as-usual' industrial agricultural model. We worked with others to open new spaces for international dialogue and capacity building, including the global Nyéléni Forum on Agroecology, in Mali, in February, which allowed the global movement for agroecology to articulate a vision of what agroecology is—and what it is not. Initial results have been very encouraging, with official texts echoing our demands.

We also saw rising resistance to governments' attempts to impose unjust and environmentally damaging free trade and investment agreements. Friends of the Earth Europe's campaign against the proposed EU-US Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership helped a record 150,000 EU citizens say 'No' to corporate courts, forcing the European Commission to acknowledge public opposition. Another significant moment came in September, when Uruguay formally withdrew from the Trade in Services Agreement negotiations, because of threats to public services.

strengthening our movements

We continued to build public pressure for transformative change, through collaborative movement-building activities, and by strengthening our own grass-roots based federation.

In 2015 we prioritised building a global movement for climate and energy justice in the run up to the United Nations' COP 21 climate change summit, which was held in Paris in December. As anticipated the summit resulted in a deal in which justice and ambition were inexcusably missing. But it also served as a pivotal moment for the emerging climate justice movement, triggering a torrent of ambition around promoting people's solutions based on equality, solidarity and peace. As a result civil society and social

movements emerged stronger and increasingly united, ready to mobilise to make 'people power' a reality in 2016 and beyond.

We also engaged with Pope Francis in advance of the publication of his encyclical on climate change in May. This influential document, directed at the world's 1.2 billion Roman Catholics, reflects our positions, taking a firm stand on climate change, and arguing that there is a moral imperative to act with the utmost urgency and ambition.

Throughout the year we worked to build and balance our own federation as well, including by strengthening regional coordination and building member groups' capacity. The annual assembly of FoE Latin America and the Caribbean (ATALC) reemphasised the groups' commitment to transformation towards 'buen vivir' for the peoples of the region. Plans discussed by FoEI member groups in the Asia Pacific regional meeting included developing work on alternatives, with a view to transforming Asia. A meeting of FoE Africa's consultative board in Cameroon sought to strengthen FoE Africa's regional structure. FoE Europe launched its first sustainability school, aiming to strengthen the network across Europe, and create common political analyses of system change from a social justice, environmental justice and human rights perspective.

new problems, new approaches

We continue to prioritise collaboration with local communities and indigenous peoples to conserve the world's forests, by challenging the global scourge of large-scale tree plantations and destructive logging, strengthening local communities' rights, and promoting Community Forest Management (CFM). However the world's forests and forest communities are facing new and additional threats.

Many governments are now backing 'false solutions' to environmental problems in a bid to create profit-making opportunities that draw in private finance—even when there is evidence that those 'solutions' are making the situations they are supposed to address worse rather than better. Adding insult to injury, policies that commodify or financialise the world's forests and biodiversity in this way are driving a transfer of traditional territories and resources into the hands of large corporations and international financiers.

Our campaigns will continue to challenge these false solutions. In 2015 we published research demonstrating that Community Forest Management (CFM) could play a pivotal, effective and equitable role in conserving the world's forests and biodiversity while dealing with climate change.

financial situation

Although 2015 was expected to be a year with reduced funding, several successful fundraising efforts led to income being better than anticipated. Contributions from our member groups also showed an unexpected increase of 21%. The total result for the year amounted to \in 2,05 million, almost \in 100,000 more than we budgeted for in 2014. In addition to this positive turn of events, two applications submitted to the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the course of 2015 were approved at higher levels than expected.

The budget for 2016 will therefore show a significant increase and the scope of our activities will grow correspondingly. At the end of 2015 we started making preparations to recruit the five staff necessary for these new activities. Adapting to this new size and working on the inception phase for the two large new grants will define the first part of 2016.

accounting policies

general

The financial report has been made in accordance with the Dutch Accounting Standard Board's Guideline RJ 640 for 'Notfor-profit organizations'. The salaries at Friends of the Earth International comply with the recommendations of the VFI (Association for Philanthropic Institutions), as well as with the Code Wijffels.

All assets and liabilities are stated at their face value, unless otherwise mentioned. Foreign currency amounts are valued against the exchange rate of the last day of each quarter, using XE Currency Converter. Exchange rate differences have been included in the result.

tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are valued at purchase price minus depreciation. Depreciation is based on the expected duration of life. The tangible assets are divided in inventory, telephone switchboard & network infrastructure, and computers (hardware & software over Euro 500). Depreciation of computers and switchboard is 30% for the first 3 years and 10% for the fourth year. Depreciation of inventory is spread over five years, for second-hand furniture an estimate of its remaining life is made.

liquid assets

All cash and bank balances listed under liquid assets are discretionary. The funds in the ASN savings accounts generated an average interest of 0.9 % in 2015.

accounts receivable and accounts payable

If there is an account receivable and an account payable with the same Friends of the Earth member group, the outstanding amounts will be balanced. An overview of the balances of the largest debts and liabilities can be found in note to the balance 3b.

result

The result is the difference between core income on the one hand and core expenses at historical cost on the other hand, taking into account the above valuation principles.

statutory provisions governing profit appropriation

The Vereniging Friends of the Earth International is a Dutch association with no purpose of gain. In accordance with the statutes of association of the Vereniging its Executive Committee is entitled to add a positive result to the reserves or to a provision in support of the organisation's objectives.

appropriation of result

By decision of the Executive Committee the full result of Euro 50,310 will be added to the reserves. From the allocated reserves 6,882 Euros have been withdrawn from the HRD Emergency Fund. The fund for the fundraising investment will be supplemented by 25,000 Euros and the fund for membership development by 6,000 Euros. 9,985 Euros were collected for support to Nepal after its earthquake and have been added to a fund allocated for this purpose. The result of supplemented and withdrawn allocations, an amount of 16,207 Euros, will be added to the general reserves.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To: the Board of Vereniging Friends of the Earth International, Amsterdam.

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Vereniging Friends of the Earth International, Amsterdam, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December 2015, the statement of income and expenses for the year then ended and the notes, comprising a summary of the accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Board's responsibility
